Pastor Matt's Message for June 2022

It will start again like it does every year. It will start the first day the temperature gets above 80°. "I wonder how hot it will get this summer". "Looks like summer is here." "I can't stand hot weather." The irony of it all, is that just a couple months ago we were all complaining about the cold. We were wishing and praying for warmer weather. And, of course, once the warmer weather gets here we will be complaining about it. Just in the past week there has been beautiful weather with no cold and no heat and I find myself wishing it would be 70° and sunny year-round. Does such a place actually exist on this planet? Such a climate does exist and you don't necessarily need to go far to get there. Just enter the nearest building with electric lights and central air: it's called climate control.

For most of human history and for much of humanity today, climate and weather are an unalterable fact of life. Down through the ages we have built various shelters to shield us from the elements. Until modern technology, even our best structures required us to adjust life according to the weather. The cold required fire wood. We adjusted our work to stay out of the blistering heat. The amount of work that needed to be done outdoors made not working outside in the elements not an option. The length of day light determined when we worked and slept and for how long. Sure, people would wish and pray for favorable weather. But people also knew that complaining was pointless. You have only so much control and no amount of work can change that fact. Second guessing or complaining accomplishes nothing. You make do and humbly hope to God for the best. For those whose daily lives are still controlled by what's happening with the weather, faith that God will work things out remains the greatest comfort.

For most of us, the weather is not a determining factor of everyday life. Most of the time the weather is a momentary passing curiosity or inconvenience as we pass beneath the sky going from one climate controlled structure, to a climate controlled vehicle, to another climate controlled structure. Our work and our home lives occur for the most part indoors. It has now become out of the ordinary, shocking or even intolerable when the weather changes our schedules and routines.

Our daily climate mastery has given our culture a greater sense of mastery over our daily lives. We have lost some of the intimacy of knowing daily that we live by chance and God's grace in the face of the changing elements. It is then only a small step to assume our daily mastery of our lives might mean mastery of our destiny as well. Yet, all this mastery is an illusion. There are certainly consequences to our actions, both good and bad. Yet there is much that happens in life that is beyond our control. No one can prevent all misfortune in life from striking such as the market collapsing, illness or accidents. The intricate twists and turns of each day have the potential to visit us with the unexpected at any moment.

The changing of the seasons is an overdue reminder that we live by God's grace in the face of the sometimes unfathomable unexpectedness of life. Whether it's a snow storm or a blazing hot day, maybe we would get a bit less annoyed if we simply remember that we don't have as much control of our lives as we would like to think or our mastery of climate control might suggest. That we just might be reminded that our greatest comfort is not by our power but by the power of God.

Bible Lesson for Kids

The Parable of the Good Samaritan

Luke 10:25-37



Jesus told many parables, or stories, that helped his listeners understand God's love for them. This lesson is about caring for our neighbors. We have learned: "Love your neighbor as yourself." We may ask: Who is my neighbor?

We usually think of a neighbor as a person or family who lives near us. We may know them and see them often. They may be "just like us" in many ways. We say "hi" to each other and we are happy to help one other if help is needed. But how should we act if we meet a person who is not "like us"?

This parable will help us understand that God considers all people worthy of our love, no matter how different they may be from us:

A Jewish man walked from the city of Jerusalem to Jericho, along a dangerous road. Robbers attacked him and took his clothes, leaving him on the ground, badly injured. Would anyone come along soon and help him?

First, a priest, came toward him. He saw the man, but passed by on the other side of the road. Another man came along, also saw him and he, too, kept walking.

Then a Samaritan man, with his donkey, came along and saw the injured man. Jews at that time were known to dislike the Samaritans, but this traveler felt compassion for the suffering man. He cleaned his wounds and smoothed them with oil to ease the pain. Then he helped the injured man onto his donkey and took him to an inn. The Samaritan took care of him there. Later, he asked the innkeeper to check on him and also paid for his stay at the inn.

As Jesus finished telling this parable, he asked one listener: "Who was the neighbor in this story?" He answered: "The one who showed mercy was the neighbor." Jesus said: "Go and do as he did." <u>Luke 10:37</u>

Jesus told this story to teach us how all of us can show compassion, which is caring; and mercy, which is understanding, to people who are not "just like us". If they are a difference race, from a far-away place or practice a different religion, God tells us to show love to all people, just as God loves all people. We are to demonstrate love and care to others, whatever their religious or ethnic background. In this way we teach those around us to be kind, too!




