MESSAGE FROM PASTOR MATT

In May of 2022, I wrote a newsletter article on the Holy Spirit. That article was written in preparation for introducing the practice of doing "God Sightings" to the congregation. By doing God Sightings, I knew we would be opening the door for the Holy Spirit to be active in our lives in ways we have not noticed before. Now, two years after introducing God Sightings, the Strategic Mission Plan is challenging us to go a step further than seeing what God is doing in our lives. We are going to start asking what God wants to do with our lives. What is God calling us to do though our baptism, empowered by the Holy Spirit?

Please re-read the article from the May 2022 newsletter (https://www.adventrichboro.org/hp_wordpress/wpcontent/uploads/2022/05/2022-May-Newsletter.pdf). As you do so, reflect on how doing God Sightings has impacted your sense of the Holy Spirit. Then imagine how that enhances sense of the Holy Spirit can guide you in your life.

<u>What is the Holy Spirit</u>? Let's start with the word "spirit". Spirit can be defined as an essential animating energy. A person's spirit or soul is an immaterial energy that embodies their essential being or characteristics. To have high spirits is the be full of energy or vigor. One can do things with a type of spirit such as cooperation, happiness, discontent, etc. A person's spirit can convey their essential presence. It is possible to

sense someone in the room with you without hearing or seeing them while reading a book or being busy with a task. Team spirit reflects the bond and energy of the team. The energy of a winning team and a losing team can be very different. A good pep talk can change the energy of a team. A team with strong team spirit can overcome a team of superstars with weak team spirit. Players sense the spirit of a team and will change teams, going to one with a better spirit. Players will even forego opportunities for higher pay to stay somewhere with strong team spirit. Another example of spirit can be the relationship between two people such as in a marriage. I was told once that marriage should be treated like a third person in the relationship, where, just as you do things to care for your spouse, you need to also do things to care for the marriage. The marriage itself takes on an essential nature that can be sensed like the presence of an individual or the spirit of a team.

In scripture, the Holy Spirit is often associated with the animating power of wind, fire and water. The Holy Spirit is essential God energy. The primary characteristic of that God energy is love. Thomas Aquinas defines the Holy



Spirit as the spirit of love between God the Father and God the Son. This Spirit of love is so strong it embodies the essence of God and becomes it own person. We experience God the Father as the Creator, God the Son as the Redeemer and God the Holy Spirit as the Sustainer actively sustaining us through the ways we are created and redeemed. Every time we experience God's love, we are experiencing the Holy Spirit.

<u>So, do you sense that the Holy Spirit is active in your life?</u> This is not a question of whether the Holy Spirit is active in your life at all times and at every moment, whether you sense it or not. This is promised to you through your baptism. So, do you sense the Holy Spirit? It can be difficult for us as human beings to sense the Holy Spirit at every single moment of our lives. We get distracted. Our sins get in the way. But there are ways to get better at sensing the Holy Spirit. There are patterns to how God loves us.

Sometimes, in order to see a pattern, we need someone to point out the pattern to us. The pattern of God's love can be seen in reading the Bible. Christian community, which in itself embodies the Holy Spirit, can point out the patterns of God's love to us through worship, prayer, bible study, service and fellowship. Taking time to identify "God's sightings" of God's activity in our lives and giving God thanks in prayer can dramatically strengthen our sense of the Holy Spirit's presence in our lives. We can sense God's love any time we witness any and every expression of love between people. We can sense God's love in everything God has created. Stopping and taking time to savor nature can reveal a strong sense of the Holy Spirit.

As our sense of the Holy Spirit's activity is deepened, our sense of being loved by God is deepened, and our sense

of participating in God's love in the lives those around us is heightened. As our sense of the Holy Spirit activity in our lives in the past and the present is honed, we gain a sense of how the Holy Spirit will be active in our lives into the future. We start to recognize how God wants us to participate in the pattern of God's love all around us. We begin to recognize how our gifts and abilities fit into that pattern. The Holy Spirit starts to show us new gifts and abilities. As the pattern of God's love is revealed in greater parts of our lives, we get a sense of the Holy Spirit leading us or calling us to love those around us in different ways. All of this makes us feel



inspired, excited, reassured, empowered, nourished and sustained. It is like being in a wonderful relationship or on a really awesome team, only better, because it is the essence of God's love of which we are a part.



2025 ANNUAL CONGREGATIONAL MEETING AND PROPOSED CONSTITUTION VOTE

The Annual Congregational Meeting was held on Sunday, February 23, 2025, after a single service of worship.

At the meeting, the business of the Church was conducted, including the review of the 2024 Annual Report. Copies of the report were provided in advance of and at the meeting.

The annual meeting also included the first of two required congregational votes to approve the proposed constitution. With almost 30 people attending this meeting, the outcome of the 1st vote resulted in approval of the new constitution. The process leading up to the 1st vote included two Q and A sessions about the proposed constitution, which were held on January 19 and 26, 2025. During these meetings, members of the congregation asked questions and sought clarification about the changes from the current to the proposed constitution. Time was also given at the annual meeting to answer questions.

This sets the stage for the 2nd congregational vote to approve the proposed constitution, which is an ELCA requirement. Accordingly, a congregational meeting will take place on March



23, 2025 at 10:00 a.m., after the single worship service at 9:00 a.m. If you are unable to attend this meeting in person, please plan to participate via Zoom.

RECYCLING CAN TABS FOR RONALD McDonald House Charities



DID YOU KNOW? – SAINT PATRICK'S DAY

St. Patrick's Day is a holiday that celebrates the life of Ireland's patron saint, Saint Patrick, and the arrival of Christianity in Ireland. St. Patrick's original name was Maewyn Succat, and he was born to Christian parents in Roman Britain. His father was a deacon and his grandfather, a priest. But St. Patrick (according to his own account) was not religious as a child. St. Patrick's Day is celebrated on March 17, the day legend says he died.

The meal that has become a St. Patrick's Day staple—corned beef and cabbage—was an American innovation. While ham and cabbage were eaten in Ireland, corned beef offered a cheaper substitute for impoverished immigrants. Irish Americans living in the slums of lower Manhattan in the late 19th century and early 20th purchased leftover corned beef from ships returning from the tea trade in China. The Irish would boil the beef three times—the last time with cabbage—to remove some of the brine.



The first recorded parade on the Feast Day of St. Patrick was held on March 17, 1601, in a Spanish colony in modern-day St. Augustine, Florida. More than a century later, Irish soldiers serving in the English military marched in Boston in 1737 and in New York City in 1762. Today, St. Patrick's Day is celebrated in more countries than any other national festival.
